UNDERSTANDING FERPA

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is the Federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. According to this law, these rights transfer from the parent to the student once the student attends a school beyond high school. Even though your student is still a minor, their academic record belongs to them. **WE CANNOT DISCLOSE INFORMATION TO ANYBODY BUT THE STUDENT.**

TUITION AND FEES

Your student's first step will be **APPLYING** to SLCC and there is a one-time \$40 application fee associated with this. When a student **REGISTERS** for a class, tuition is charged at a rate of \$5 per credit-hour. Most courses are 3 or 4 credit-hours but may be more for year-long courses. There may also be class fees for materials that are charged by the high school. All correspondence regarding financial matters at SLCC will be sent to your student through their SLCC e-mail.
