OBJECTIVES:

FIRST SEMESTER PLANNING

Meeting with an advisor as early as possible before and during your first semester at SLCC leads to college success and completion. Your academic and/ or career advisor will assist you in mapping out your degree and educational goals.

Student Learning Outcomes

After the Advising session, you (the student) should be able to:

1. Understand the difference between the AS, AA, APE, and AAS Degrees.
2. Describe the math and English sequence as required for your major, using the placement scores chart with 100% accuracy.
3. Explain accurately the purpose of General Education and major course requirements using the purple or beige sheet.
4. Describe your enrollment status (part-time/full-time) and how your status affects your length of enrollment toward degree completion and cost of tuition.
5. Summarize how you will use time management skills to create a realistic and balanced schedule, include time for studying, work, family, and leisure activities.
6. List correctly the pre-requisite courses required for your major of study as they appear in the college catalog.
7. Demonstrate mapping out a two semester plan of classes in DegreeWorks, considering Developmental Education (if required), General Education, and major course requirements.
8. Identify resources available for undecided students or those exploring an area of study, including free and paid assessments.
9. Describe where you will find information on the SLCC website about academic advising, major and career exploration, learning communities, tutoring, experiential language credits (If applicable), and other learning resources and services.
10. Express the benefits of being engaged in campus and/ or community events and activities to enhance your learning in the classroom.

SECOND AND THIRD SEMESTER PLANNING

Continue your visits with your program advisor or meet with a career advisor. These are great opportunities to evaluate your position on the road to graduation and reinforce a relationship with the advisors. They will help you navigate your academic journey to its completion.

Student Learning Outcomes

After your advising session, you should be able to:

1. State with certainty your current grade-point-average and whether it meets academic standards requirements based on a SLCC Degree Audit in DegreeWorks.
2. Describe accurately the remaining degree requirements, including General Education and required courses as presented in your DegreeWorks Audit.
3. Demonstrate mapping out a two-year plan of classes in DegreeWorks that includes General Education and program of study courses.
4. After meeting with a Career Advisor identify your personality type and three occupations for further exploration (For Exploring students).

5. Explain, using the SLCC website where to find information about transferring to a four-year institution, including: transfer events, frequently asked questions, when to visit with four-year institution representatives on campus, etc.
6. Use TransferUtah.org to inquire about course equivalencies among Utah System of Higher Education colleges and universities.
7. Know the name of, and where to find, your program advisor.
8. Describe where to find on the SLCC website information about policies and procedures that may have an effect on your registration, academic progress, and graduation.
9. Explain where to find information on the SLCC website about Student Employment, Cooperative Education, internships, Thayne Center for Service Learning, and the Center for Health and Counseling.
10. Explain how learning outside of the classroom will help you develop as a lifelong learner.
11. Reflect and express your educational achievements and challenges.
