Be prepared for upcoming changes to Academic Advising. First, how students schedule their appointments with Program Advisors will change soon. Additionally, we will add a new advisor in the School of Business.

Currently, students and prospective students schedule their appointments via an online service called YouCanBook.me.com. Along with the entire SLCC system, we are moving to MySuccess which you can access via your MySLCC. The School of Business was selected to pilot the roll out so there still are some bugs to work out. For now, you can still schedule your appointments either via YouCanBook.me as before, or you can now schedule via MySuccess. Since it is possible to make appointments on both, confusion has created situations of double booking but we hope to work through those problems. We hope you will be patient with us as it develops.

A new advisor will begin working with brand new students in both Business and CSIS majors. Those students will work only with the new advisor throughout their time at SLCC from beginning to end. We're unsure of the start date for this new position, another new pilot program starting at the School of Business but a decision is expected soon.

Other news:

Students who, because of delays in Financial Aid, postpone purchasing textbooks and consequently begin their semesters behind in homework should be aware of and consider the STIL Program. STIL is an acronym for Student Tuition Installment Loan program that lets you spread your tuition and fees over four monthly payments for fall and spring semesters, and three payments for the summer semester. There's a \$30 application fee per semester. Often, it buys you time to avoid a late fee while you wait for your financial aid to arrive. Additionally, if you find yourself in this situation, please come talk to your program advisors to

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discuss possible temporary assistance.

The waitlist process is changing so students will only be able to join the waitlist up to the day before classes begin. Students can then only add classes as spots become available. Students should NOT go to classes to ask to be added.

Finally, students can view and register for an Accuplacer Tips & Tricks workshop on the calendar. Registration is not mandatory to attend and walk-ins are welcome. Students interested in taking or retaking the Accuplacer are encouraged to prepare for the Accuplacer by attending a tips & tricks session and/or by visiting the [Testing Services](#) web page for more test preparation [practice](#).

Expansion of SLCC Promise program

President Huftalin authorized the expansion of the SLCC Promise program to include Summer terms effective Summer 2018. Students taking 6 or more credits who receive Pell awards that do not cover their full tuition and fees will have the remaining balance covered by SLCC as long as they meet all other SLCC Promise eligibility requirements (see <https://www.slcc.edu/promise/> for details). SLCC and UofU Create Pathway to Financial Planning Career

On January 30, 2018, Salt Lake Community College School of Business signed a program-specific articulation agreement with the University of Utah's College of Social and Behavioral Science. Under the agreement, SLCC's graduates in the Associate of Science in Business or Associate of Applied Science in Finance and Credit who declare the Family, Community and Human Development Major and the Financial Planning certificate will receive significant credit toward their bachelor's degree.

Specifically, the SLCC transfer students will receive credit for 3 hours of major elective credits and 12 hours of allied credits. In addition, by completing FIN 1050 and FIN 2200 at SLCC with grades of C- or higher will receive credit for FCS 3500 at the University of Utah.

The ultimate goal of the agreement is to create a smooth pathway for students who wish to make a career as a Certified Financial Planner (CFP). Becoming a CFP requires 5 elements: 1) a bachelor's degree in anything; 2) completion of six specific courses in financial planning; 3) passing an industry certification examination similar to the CPA or BAR exam; 4) three years of industry experience; and 5) passing a background check.

The important thing to know is that the U of U's degree program includes the six courses required to sit for the exam. Graduates of most schools still need to take these courses after graduating, but at the U, they are part of the Bachelor's curriculum. After passing the examination and amassing 3 years of industry experience (which can at least partially be done while in school), graduates can become certified as a CFP.

In Utah, anyone can call himself or herself a financial planner. The CFP credential sets one apart from the typical financial planner. Because of their advanced training, CFP's have a decided edge in the job market, and command higher salaries than typical financial planners without their level of training. According to Glassdoor financial advisor jobs have salaries beginning as low as \$30,000 per year, yet according to the University of Utah, those with a CFP credential earn an average of \$104,000 annually.

This agreement provides a clear, guided pathway all the way from beginning college to a high-paying career in a high-demand industry. It is not an easy path, but it gets one from beginning to completion in 4 years, with a very lucrative career opportunity at the end.

SLCC Students Assist Qualifying Individuals and Families with Their Tax Returns

SLCC students once again have the opportunity to work alongside Westminster students at a Pro Bono Tax Clinic, an official VITA (Volunteer Income Tax Assistance) site. For the 2017 filing season, SLCC students doubled the Westminster workforce at the Pro Bono Clinic and were able to serve more clients than ever. Students enjoyed the opportunity to give back to the community and learned many new skills. Since last year's program was so successful, we've partnered with Westminster again for the 2018 filing season.

Students are certified by the IRS to prepare individual income tax returns and are trained as financial advocates. Students also receive ethics training related to tax preparation, cultural sensitivity training, and learn client interviewing skills.

Westminster has operated the Pro Bono Tax Clinic for several years and has become one of the largest VITA sites in the state. SLCC students have the opportunity to work the site for elective accounting credits or purely as a volunteer.

The Pro Bono Tax Clinic operates from January 29th through April 17th, where qualified individuals and families can receive assistance with preparing their tax returns and learn about (and apply for) other resources/opportunities available to them.

The clinic is located at the Salt Lake County Building at 2001 S. State Street, North Building Atrium, in Salt Lake City, Utah and the Clinic's days and hours of operation are Monday through Thursday from 4:30pm to 9:30pm and on Saturdays from 10am until 6pm.

School of Business Offers Classes through SLCC's Prison Education Program

Beginning Summer of 2018, BUS 1010 Introduction to Business will be offered to women at the Utah State Prison in Draper. Introduction to Business will be offered to men in Fall 2018. Plans are underway to also offer BUS 1040 Business Ethics and BUS 1050 Foundations of Business.

The Prison Education Program, under the direction Kurt Guner, Program Manager, began this year. There has been a steep learning curve and a massive amount of effort from school and prison administrators, only to find that the enthusiasm and energy of the students has exceeded their wildest expectations. After spending the fall semester recruiting faculty, testing students, and preparing classes, six classes were launched in the Utah State Prison in Draper (for Men: Math 980, English 1010, and Communications 1010; for Women: Math 980, English 1010, and Sociology 1010) and one in the Central Utah Correctional Facility in Gunnison (History 1510). Across the board, the faculty teaching these classes have reported that students are engaged and passionate, going above and beyond their assignments to grapple with the material and connect it to their lives.

When this program was conceived, it was assumed there would be challenges and setbacks. This program requires SLCC to account for a new type of student with different needs, both in the classroom and in the financial aid office. Currently, the tuition and student fees are covered by grant funds.

The Registrar, Admissions Office, and Testing Center worked to find solutions and get the students enrolled. The faculty members adjusted for life on "the inside" by redesigning their classes to work without any internet access for students (no Canvas, no outside research, no YouTube videos, etc.). The result has been a smashing success so far. The School of Business will be adding additional course options to the list of courses offered at the prison. The Prison Education Program hopes to expand and add more staff in the future to accommodate the growing student body.

UWHEN Annual Leadership Conference

SLCC and Utah Valley University's School of Business Sign Articulation Agreement

We are very excited to announce that on Wednesday, February 21, administrators from SLCC and UVU's School of Business met to sign an articulation agreement, which will provide for credit transfers between SLCC and UVU, and culminates in the award of a bachelor's degree at Utah Valley University.

This agreement clarifies transfer policies, including admissions and student status, and offers SLCC students in the AS Business program a clear pathway to completing an Associate's degree at SLCC and transferring to UVU as a matriculated, upper division student pursuing a Bachelor's degree in any program, except for Hospitality Management and Legal Studies, offered through the Woodbury School of Business.

The terms of the agreement are:

- Prior to transfer, SLCC students will earn the Associate of Science (AS) Business by satisfactorily completing the courses listed in the catalog and specified in this agreement with a 2.0 cumulative GPA, including a 2.5 cumulative GPA in all business courses, and a minimum grade of B- in BUS 2200 and CSIS 2010. Accounting majors only are required to have a B- or higher in Accounting 2010.
- SLCC students must complete the Woodbury School of Business Orientation and meet with a Woodbury School of Business advisor. Matriculated, upper division status will be granted to AS Business graduates from SLCC who meet these academic performance standards.
- SLCC students must meet program-specific admission and graduation criteria as outlined in the SLCC and UVU academic catalogs.
- SLCC students should seek early advisement at both SLCC and UVU to ensure proper sequencing of courses and efficient time to degree completion.

We look forward to a long and close relationship with the Woodbury School of Business, as we provide options for our Business students to transfer and complete their Bachelor degrees in business.

Students of all religious backgrounds are encouraged to visit and use the space as they feel appropriate.

Tart aux Fraise

When it comes to French baking, Chef Cynthia Alberts with Salt Lake Community College knows her stuff. She along with SLCC student Stacy Peronnet showed Big Budah how to make a delicious Tart aux Fraise.

SABLE DOUGH INGREDIENTS

120g (4.23oz) unsalted butter, cubed
265g (9.35oz) plain (all purpose) flour
65g (2.29oz) icing (confectioners') sugar
pinch of salt
30g (1.06oz) almond meal
47g (1.66oz) whole eggs
unsalted butter for tart rings
100g (3.53oz) (soft)

In the bowl of a stand mixer fitted with a paddle, add the cold butter, flour, sugar, salt, and almond meal, and beat until the mixture resembles breadcrumbs. Add the eggs and continue mixing. Bring the mixture together by hand until it forms a ball. Remove the dough from the bowl and roll it to 5mm thickness between 2 layers of acetate paper. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate for 1-2 hours.

Grease small tart rings with butter. Remove the dough from fridge and cut strips of dough to fit and line each tart ring. Cut the base of the tart and set it into the tart rings. Place the tart rings into the fridge for 5 minutes to cool. Once cool, remove from the fridge and trim the sides of the tart using a knife. Bake shells at 330°F for 20 minutes.

PASTRY CREAM

Pastry cream is a staple in pastry kitchens, used to fill cakes, cream puffs, éclairs napoleons, tarts, and other pastries. It is cooked on the stove into a creamy thick custard made from a mixture of milk, eggs, sugar, and cornstarch.

INGREDIENTS

2 cups milk
½ cup sugar
3 Tbs. cornstarch
¼ Tsp. salt
4 egg yolks, lightly beaten
4 Tbs. unsalted butter
2 tsp. vanilla extract or Kirsh



Bring the milk to a simmer in a heavy-bottomed saucepan. Meanwhile, in a mixing bowl, stir together the sugar, cornstarch, and salt. Whisk in egg yolks. Gradually add the hot milk to the sugar mixture, whisking constantly. Pour the milk mixture back into a clean saucepan and cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until the mixture boils and thickens slightly. Cook, stirring, until vigorously for 2 minutes. Remove the saucepan from the heat and stir in the butter.

Let cool to room temperature, stirring occasionally. Add the vanilla, cover and refrigerate until thoroughly chilled. Pipe into the prebaked tart.

ASSEMBLY

Slice (fraises) strawberries thin and arrange on top of the tart. Heat 4 TBS. of apricot jam with 1 TBS. water.

Brush strawberries to preserve.
