In order to work as a Substance Use Disorder Counselor, students must satisfy individual state requirements, independent of SLCC graduation requirements. - The minimum education requirements for a substance use disorder professional credential are:
 - An associate degree in human services or related field from an approved school.
 - Successful completion of 90 quarter or 60 semester college credits in courses from an approved school.
 - o Successful completion of an approved and registered apprenticeship program.
- The minimum amount of instruction required in topics related to the substance use disorder profession is at least:
 - Forty-five quarter college credits.
 - Thirty semester college credits.
 - Four hundred fifty hours of related/supplemental instruction provided by a competent instructor in an approved and registered apprenticeship program.
- Education and apprenticeship program course work must include the following topics specific to individuals with substance use disorder in their recovery:
