You will use everyday activities such as dressing, eating, cooking or playing as therapeutic techniques to help patients achieve or recover their full, independent and healthy lifestyles.

WHY SLCC?

The OTA program prepares you to work in settings like:

- Acute care hospitals
- Rehabilitation centers/clinics
- Psychiatric hospitals
- Community living facilities
- Home health agencies
- Community mental health centers
- School systems/early intervention
- Nursing homes

In addition to regular studies, students participate in the on-site SLCC Occupational Therapy clinic, providing therapy to need-based individuals and others from the community.

ADMISSION PROCESS

- Be admitted to SLCC as a matriculated student.
- Request an **official evaluation** of transcripts and submit to the SLCC Incoming Transcript Office, if applicable.
- Application information including prerequisites, transcripts, and essay can be found at: slcc.edu/hs/admissions
- AP courses – AP scores of 3 or higher for a prerequisite course may be considered for admission into the program. However, this does not guarantee acceptance into the program.

PREREQUISITES

Note: All prerequisites must be completed **before** applying to the Occupational Therapy Assistant program with a C grade or better unless otherwise noted.

- BIOL 2320/2325 Human Anatomy Lecture/Lab (4) (limited to two attempts, and within the past 5 years)
- ENGL 1010 Intro to Writing (EN)(3) APA section or ENGL 2010 Intermediate Writing^{^*}
- Any QL or MATH 1010 Integrated Algebra (QS)(4) (MATH 1040 Intro to Statistics (QL)(3) or MATH 1045 preferred)^{^**}
- COMM 1010 Elements of Eff. Comm (CM)(3) or COMM 2110 Interpersonal Comm (CM)(3)[^]
- PSY 1100 or FHS 1500 Human Growth & Dev (SS)(3)[^]
- OTA 1020 (3) (minimum B grade; limited to two attempts, and within the past 5 years)[^]

THE CURRICULUM

The OTA program curriculum design is based on applied practice. Students are required to spend 150 hours or more involved in service learning, which may be outside of scheduled course times. Students with a B average or higher will graduate as Civically Engaged Scholars.

Students may be required to attend conferences and out-of-state activities. The expenses of these requirements are additional student costs. Students will participate in Fieldwork I experiences that align with coursework taught that respective semester. Students will also participate in two Fieldwork II experiences requiring full-time training in the last semester of the program.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

- One cohort of 24 students is admitted every fall semester.
- Accepted students must take the OTA courses in the order outlined in the curriculum.
- Students may come in contact with blood-borne pathogens and infectious diseases, and all students in the OTA program must follow proper OSHA procedures and practice universal precautions.
- Accepted students are required to attend the mandatory new student orientation day.
- Accepted students must complete program required immunizations and certifications before clinical placements.
- Students will be responsible to provide their own transportation to clinical sites.
