Programming or Service Highlights:

- Significant bump in social media reach, doubling our users and engagement
- This academic year, we hosted several Student Voices panels that continue to draw crowds. The four student panels we hosted were: Health Sciences Student Voices, Women Student Voices, African American/ African and Hunger and Homelessness.
- Clubs Manual reviewed and updated to meet institutional policy
- SLCC Trustees engaged with students through Profiles in Leadership
- Students engaged in organizations within Student Life and Leadership provided 320 plus hours of service within their communities
- Two successful forums for students interested in the School of Business and the School of Arts, Communication and Media
- Multiple collaboration efforts with departments and groups across the college including Health & Wellness Services, the Thayne Center for Service and Learning, the School of Arts, Communication and Media, Academic Advising, Athletics, Black Student Union, Polynesian Unity Association, Latinos in Action, School Relations
- Increase in visibility of SLCCSA/SLL at regional campuses led to a rise in attendance at events.

- Relocated the Senate and Clubs Offices from the second level of the Student Center at Taylorsville Redwood Campus downstairs to the former Lair to better coordinate services
- Collaborated with Jason Pickavance, Educational Initiatives Director on Open Resource Textbooks that resulted in a growth in the departments and faculty members utilizing these resources
- Served over 4000 community members and students through planned Family Events
- Over 700 students, staff and faculty participated in StrengthsQuest trainings
- Aviation Maintenance Technicians Club placed First in the National Aviation Maintenance Competition
- Repositioned our office in the Student Pavilion at the Jordan Campus to provide the Health and Wellness Office a new home after they were displaced by another department moving into their location
- SLCC Social Work Association has hosted a “coats for cocoa” drive and have received 172 coats and around 400 articles of other clothing. The Association took their donation to the Road Home, homeless shelter. During this time Channel 2 News interviewed the club about their involvement with the SLCC Food Pantry and how they are involved with helping local communities. The interview was shown during the Sterling Poulsen “Pay It Forward” segment.
- This year’s SLCCSA Elections voting record was broken this year with over 2400 votes.
- Added 15 new clubs for a total of 67 organizations available for students to find their fit in.
- The Multicultural Art Show hosted 42 artists and 73 pieces of art. Over 400 students, faculty and staff came to view the student’s amazing talent.
- Student senators assisted multiple throughout the year with issues ranging from faculty grievances to providing more gender restrooms on campus.

Assessment Highlights:

- Discovered a better tool, the National Association for Campus Activities Competency Guide for College Student Leaders (endorsed by NASPA, CAS and ACPA) to assess the growth and development of the Executive Council while striving to assess their positions this year
- Six students participated in the Washington, D.C. internship program
- Awarded 45 deserving students a SLCCSA Book Scholarship from a \$10,000 fund.
- Awarded 10 students \$2500 for Single Parent Appreciation Scholarship
- Under the area of effective student governance, in addition to the service listed above, our students partnered with Envision Utah to collect feedback for the future growth of the state.
- Under the area of robust student life, in addition to the service listed above, the Executive Council and the Social Work Association collaborated to develop the parameters of a SLCC Student Financial Resource Center, which would be temporarily housed within Student Life & Leadership.
- Under the area of leadership development, in addition to the service listed above, the office of Student Life & Leadership hosted the summer and winter leadership conferences. Over 300 student leaders from various areas in the institution participated in these two conferences. Summer leadership conference highlighted motivational speaker Susan Leahy who presented Leadership Boot Camp. Winter leadership conference featured Tom Krieglstein, he focused on our student leaders can better engage other students at the college.
